Dear Sir:-

Taking cognizance of the notice given the writer by the Board of Commissioners of Tulsa County, to the effect that in their opinion sufficient effort has not been made by the writer in the matter of securing cement for the construction of the hard surfaced roads in this county; and without admitting the justice or correctness of the claim, the writer has during this past week arranged matters with the Portland Cement Associations aid, which should eliminate at least a part of the difficulty.

The Portland Cement Association is interested in the work in this county and since the inception of the project they have assisted materially in planning and executing the work. During the past week representatives of the association have interested themselves in the matter of securing cement for this work. After a conference in Kansas City, these representatives assured me of their cooperation in relieving the difficulty here. Beginning immediately five cars per week will be shipped me here by various cement companies, as soon as possible this will be built up to fifteen cars per week.

It is the plans of the writer to use this material on the Broken Arrow- Bixby Roads and on the Tulsa-Skiatook Road, however in order to complete Mile 4 on the Owasso Road, eight cars only are required, it is the intention of the writer to use this much cement on this work with preparation for the commencement of work are being made on the Tulsa-Skiatook road.

Trusting that these arrangements will solve our difficulty, the writer begs to remain,

R E S O L U T I O N .

Whereas, the report of the State Examiner and Inspector heretofore made on the audit of the records of the Court Clerk, B. F. Ingraham, for the period ending January 6th, 1919 discloses many discrepancies and errors, and

Whereas, in order to correct the records in the various courts during said period in order that such records may reflect proper balances in various cases it is necessary to make a supplemental audit covering the period from January 6th, 1919, to June 30th, 1920, and Whereas it is not more or additional expense to the county to make a complete audit for said period of the records of the present Court Clerk .

Therefore, be it resolved, that the State Examiner and Inspector, be and he is hereby directed and authorized to make a complete detailed audit of the records of the present Court Clerk from the date that he succeeded the retiring Court Clerk and up to and including the period ending June 30th, 1920.

And be it further resolved that this Board include in its annual budget for the current fiscal year and appropriation in an amount sufficient to defray the costs of such audit.

The above resolution being presented and read, its adoption was duly moved and seconded. Those voting in favor of the adoption of the resolution were: F. M. Wooden, W. L. North, and Ed Dalton, constituting all of the members of the Board.

Said resolution having received all of the votes of the Commissioners, it was declared carried and ordered that the same be placed of record and that a true and correct copy properly certified be sent to Hon. Fred Parkinson, State Examiner and Inspector, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

Gentlemen:-

By virtue of instructions received by me from Hon. Fred Parkinson, State Examiner and Inspector, I am herewith making a preliminary report on the audit of the clerk of Courts, B. F. Ingraham.

The audit was completed a short time ago, and with the audit of the various offices and departments of the county is now being reduced in the form of a typewritten report.

The general balance sheet covering the audit of Clerk B. F. Ingraham and as of January 6th, 1919, at which time he surrendered the office to his successor, John D. Porter, discloses the fact that at that date he owed balances, unpaid, in various cases, on reports, miscellaneous and liens, interest on deposits in the amount of \$5885.71; and that on that date, to wit: January 6th, 1919, he had available assets to protect said balances in the sum of \$5262.71 leaving the sum of \$622.80 to be accounted for.
