MINUTES
MANAGEMENT CONFERENCE
FEBRUARY 23, 1989

The Board of County Commissioners of Tulsa County, met at the hour of 9:00 a.m. with the following members present: John Selph, Chairman; Melvin C. Rice and Lewis Harris, Members. Members absent: none. Others present: Sheriff Stanley Glanz, Jim Helm, Leroy Jones, John Rothchild, Mack Bettis, Jerry Neeley, Wayne Carr, Caralee Adams, Sonya Colberg, Alan Lambert, Melody Bishop and Clay Edwards.

John Selph, Chairman, presiding, called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. and the following business was transacted:

Sheriff Glanz introduced David Engle as the new jail director.

As of Thursday morning (February 23, 1989) the jail population was at 590 prisoners, 40 more than allowed. Glanz stated alcoholics are finding innovative ways of getting into jail because of the weather. The Board discussed David Moss memorandum regarding the law that goes into effect July 1, stating people charged with violent offenses, offenses carrying life imprisonment or life imprisonment without parole, would not be released on bond. Also, felony offenders who have previously been convicted of two or more felonies wouldn't be released on bond. Chairman stated we are not sure what kind of impact the law will have on the overcrowding problem.
