as it covers a period from June 6th, 1918 to the close of business December 31st, 1921, and involves nearly 1700 criminal cases.

HARVEY, COURT CLERK AUDIT.

Time that we could not used advantageously on the Justice of the Peace audits caused by delays in obtaining possession of various records, has been used in the preliminary work of the Harvey Audit. To date we have practically completed the audit of the cash boon. In asmuch as we are giving presedence to the Justice of the Peace audits we have not been able to work continuously on the Harvey Audit.

QUARTERLY REPORTS OF JUSTICE OF THE PEACE.

Under the law each Justice of the Peace at the end of each quarter of a calendar year to make and file a report in all cases or matters in which the county or state is interested. This report should show among other things the amount of criminal fees earned and uncallected for the quarter, the amount of fines and county attorneys fees assessed and collected for the quarter, the amount due and paid to the county for the quarter.

Unless such report is filed and the amount due to the county has been paid to the county Treasurer a Justice of the Peace is not entitled to collect any fees from the county for a quarter. Our experience so far in auditing Justices! of the Peace have taught is that the quarterly reports in many instances are not properly made and in many instances more fees are claimed than earned. These reports should be examined and audited before claims for fees are allowed, and we deem it advisable to recommend to the Board that all quarterly reports and calims for fees by all justices of the peace be submitted to us for examination are auditing Wefore being presented to you for approval.
