At a regular meeting of the Board of County Commissioners of Tulsa County, Oklahoma, held in the office of the said commissioners in the Courthouse, in the City of Tulsa, on the 27th day of February, 1922, the following resolution was introduced by Commissioner F. M. Wooden who moved its adoption, and the motion to adopt the resolution was seconded by Commissioner Ira Short, and the chairman ordered the resolution read:

RESOLUTION.

Whereas, a controversy has arisen in respect to the sum of \$95.00, collected by S. R. Hallman a Justice of the Peace, in and for District No. 4, City of Tulsa, in various criminal cases, as officers' fees, and whereasm this Board has for sometime had under investigation the question as to whether said fees were paid or not paid to certain officers, and Whereas, after such investigation the Board finds as follows:

- 1. That said officers' fees were duly and regularly collected by the said S. R. Hallmen, Justice of the Peace.
- 2. That said fees, so collected, in the amount of \$95.00, should have been paid into the County Treasury by the said S. R. Hallman, Justice of the Peace.
- 3. That through ignorance of the law and as to what his duties were in the premises, the said Justive of the Peace paid either all or a portion of saidfees to certain officers, but this board is unable to determine the precise amount so paid to such officers, for the reason that said Justice of the Peace failed to have the officers to whom he paid such fees receipt for the same on his docket.
- 4. That regardless of whether the said Justice of the Peace disbursed said fees to such officers, he is gegally bound to the County of Tulsa for the amount of said fees in the sum of \$95.00
- 5. That we find from the evidence presented by said S. R. Halmman that there was no intentional effort to defraud the county or evade the legal payment of said fees.

Therefore, Be It Resolved that the Board of County Commissioners find that by reason of the premisses that there is due to the County of Tulsa from the said S. R. Hallman, Justice of the Peace, the sum of \$95.00, and that other than this controversy we find that the books and records of the said S. R. Hallman are in a satisfactory condition.

'The voite on the adoption of the resolution was as follows:

The resolution having received a majority of the votes cast, was declared adopted and by the chairman ordered made of record.

Moved by F. M. Wooden and seconded by Ira Short that the Bond of C. D. Evans as township road supervisor of Collinsville Township be and the same is hereby approved.

Motion Carried.

Moved by F. M. Wooden and seconded by Ira Short that the bond of W. S. Meyer ad Justice of the Peace within and for District No. 4, be and the same is hereby approved. Carried.

A motion was made by F. M. Wooden and seconded by Ira Short that the application of Pickering and Lewkowitz for relief from an erroneous assessment be allowed, and that correctly the County Assessor be authorized to re-assess/the same for the years 1919 and 1920. Carried.

A motion was made by F. M. Wooden and seconded by Ira Short that the appointment of H. E. Foster, made by Frances Harvey, Court Clerk, be and the same is hereby confirmed. Motion prevailed.

A motion was made by F. M. Wooden and seconded by Ira Short that the County Attorney he authorized to bring an action to recover any moneys known to be from S. R. Hallman
