In accordance with the regulations approved by the Secretary of the Interior, May 12, 1904, in conformity to the provisions of the Act of Congress approved April 21, 1904. (33 Stats. 204), I have made a full investigation in connection with the application of Lee Settle - a citizen by blood of the Cherokee Nation, for the removal of the restrictions upon the alienation of his allotment (except his homestead), and am, as the result of that investigation, satisfied that the removal of restrictions upon the alienation of his allotted lands, except as to his homestead will be for the best interest of the allottee, and I do recommend. The approval of this certificate does not in any manner determine the rights of the allottee to any particular tract of land.
