Warranty Deed.

This Indenture, made on this 11 day of November 1904, by and between Jemanna Irons a married woman, and George Irons, her husband, parties of the first part, and William E. Kelsell party of the second part, all of the Cherokee Nation, Indian Territory,

Witnesseth: That parties of first part, in consideration of the payment to parties of the first part by party of the second part of Four Hundred & Seventy Five Dollars, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, have bargained and sold, and by these presents do grant, bargain, sell and convey to party of second part and his heirs to have and to hold forever the following described lands, located in the Cherokee Nation, Indian Territory, together with all improvements thereon and appurtenances thereto, to-wit; A E 1/4 of NW 1/4 of Section 60 Township 20 North Range 3 East.

And the parties of the first part covenant with party of second part that the title to said lands, improvements, and appurtenances, they will warrant against the lawful claims of all persons, and parties of first part represent to party of the second part that they are recognized citizens of the Cherokee Nation and are on the roll of Cherokee Freedmen as approved by the Secretary of the Interior, and that they are not of Indian blood or Indian descent, and have full right to convey said land, improvements, and appurtenances, and that the same has been duly allotted to Jemanna Irons by the Commission to the Five Civilized Tribes.
