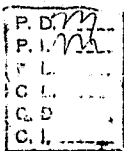

Deed of Assignment.

Claude Singley, Assignee.

I now all Men By These Presents that I, J. M. Aycock, of the City of Tulsa, in the Indian Territory, for and in consideration of the sum of One Dollar each in hand paid to me by, Claude Singley, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, and for the consideration hereinafter set forth, do hereby grant, bargain, sell, transfer, set over and assign unto the said Claude Singley and unto his assigns forever, my entire stock of goods, wares, merchandise, furniture, fixtures, tools and implements of trade owned by me and now contained in the shop and room occupied by me in the Boston Building, situate on the Southeast Corner of Boston Avenue and South Second Street in the said City of Tulsa, together with all choses in action, notes, book accounts, bills receivable and every other character of claim owing me and set out and shown by my books, accounts and book accounts now in said above mentioned shop and room, the said property above transferred and assigned being of the estimated value of One Thousand and nine Hundred (\$1,900.00) Dollars;

To Have and to Hold the same unto the said Claude Singley and unto his assigns forever.

This assignment and conveyance is, however, made in trust for the following purpose, to-wit:

The said Claude Singley after having first duly filed in the office of the Clerk of the United States Court for the Western District of the Indian Territory, a full and complete inventory of the property herein above conveyed and assigned and his bond as assignee, all in manner and form as prescribed by law, shall take possession of said above conveyed and assigned property and dispose of the same in strict conformity with the laws in force in the Indian Territory relating to "Assignments for the Benefit of Creditors"; and, out of the proceeds derived from same, shall pay:

First: all such costs and expenses of enforcing and executing this trust as may be allowed by law.

Second: Such sums as the United States Court for the Western District of the Indian Territory may, in accordance with law, allow the said Claude Singley, for his risk
