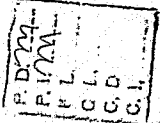

Gentlemen: We make you the following proposal: We will build for you and have ready for shipment by January 20, 1907, or as soon thereafter as possible, one of our new Duplex Flat-bed Perfected Printing Presses, known by shop letter as the Angle Bar L. E. press, to print from type, which shall be capable of printing, casting and plating at the rate of 3,000 seven (3 em) column eight page papers per hour, and it will print a four or six or 10-12 page paper as well without complicated or intricate adjustments.

The press shall be first class in both material and workmanship. The length of sheet or cut shall be 22 1/2 inches.

We will furnish with the press one set of composition rollers, one extra form and duster roller stock, one extra distributing roller stock, one set of blankets for cylinders, one counting machine, one counter sheet and two langers for same and one set of wrenches.

We will pay freight on the press to Kansas City you to pay the cartage at your place and prepare suitable foundations for the press, according to the plans furnished by us and furnish the necessary unskilled help to assist in unloading, unpacking and erecting it and from the beginning of the erection of the press furnish a competent pressman to be instructed by us how to properly run it.

We will send a competent man to superintend the erection of the press and he may remain with you a reasonable length of time to teach your pressman how to operate the press, we making no charge for same you to pay his board during his stay and furnish his transportation from Battle Creek and return. Should any delays occur in erection of press on account of your failure to have pit in readiness, power provided, or other cause whereby our man is detained you shall be liable for the expenses which are thereby incurred.
