I, Mawakehe, being first duly sworn and upon my oath, state that I am a full-blood Indian, that I am a Creek Citizen, that I do not know exactly how old I am, but I was a young lady at the beginning of the civil war. I am well acquainted with Mollie Harjo and know her to be the wife of Albert Harjo and that she is now living near Okemah, Indian Territory. The said Mollie Harjo's maiden name was Mollie Burt. Her mother's name was Leetcher. Leetcher is deceased. She died several years ago, near Hannah, Indian Territory. The number of years since she died or the date of her death, I can not remember exactly. Leetcher was a full blood Indian and a Creek Citizen. Mollie Harjo is a full blood Indian and a Creek Citizen. Leetcher's husband's name was Hothotchie Koko-Knie and he is deceased. He died before Leetcher died. He died near Hannah, Indian Territory. I knew Leetcher and her husband when they were small and a long time before they were married and have known them ever since. I know that Leetcher is the mother of the said Mollie Harjo (nee Mollie Burt). Leetcher had three other children besides the said Mollie Harjo, all of whom are deceased. Two girls and one boy. One of the girls died immediately upon her birth, the other girl died just when she was learning to sit alone, and the boy died at the time he was beginning to learn to walk. They all died so young that they had never been named. Mollie Harjo and the three other children hereinbefore mentioned are all the children that Leetcher ever had.

The three children mentioned all died near Hannah, Indian Territory. I know the said Mollie Harjo is the only living child of Leetcher.
