This indenture, made this 1 day of September, A. D. 1906, between Merretta Robinson of Tulsa, Indian Territory, and Samuel S. Robinson, her husband, and Wesley J. Coville, of Oconomowoc, Wisconsin, Witnesseth, that Whereas the said Merretta Robinson and Samuel S. Robinson are justly indebted to the said Wesley J. Coville in the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00), which is evidenced by a certain promissory note dated September 1, 1906, and due on the 1 day of September, 1908.

Now therefore, the said Merretta Robinson and Samuel S. Robinson, her husband, for the better securing the payment of the money aforesaid, with interest thereon according to the tenor and effect of said note above mentioned, do hereby grant, bargain, sell and convey unto the said Wesley J. Coville, his heirs and assigns forever, the following described real estate, to wit:

The N.W. 1/4 of the S.W. 1/4, and the N.W. 1/4 of the N.E. 1/4 of the S.W. 1/4, Section 10, Township 21, Range 13 containing 50 acres more or less, all in the Cherokee Nation, Indian Territory, with all of the improvements thereon at the present time, or that may hereafter be placed thereon, together with all of the privileges and appurtenances thereto belonging.

To Have and To Hold the above granted, bargained, and described premises unto the said Wesley J. Coville, his heirs and assigns, and unto his heirs proper use, benefit and behoof forever.

And for the consideration aforesaid, and for diverse other good and valuable considerations, I, Samuel S. Robinson, husband of said Merretta Robinson, do hereby release and quit claim unto the said Wesley J. Coville his heirs and assigns, all my right, claim, or possibility of entry in and out of the afore described premises.

Conditioned, However, that of the said Merretta Robinson and Samuel S. Robinson, their heirs, executors or administrators shall well and truly pay or cause to be paid to the said Wesley J. Coville, his executors, administrators, or assigns, the aforesaid sum of money, with interest thereon, according to the tenor of said note, then this instrument shall be void, otherwise to remain in full force and effect.
