In the matter of the application of
George S. Williams, a citizen
by birth of the Cherokee Nation,
for the removal of the section
upon the site of his allotment,
except his homestead.

In accordance with the regulations approved by the Secretary
of the Interior, May 13, 1904, in conformity to the provisions of the
Act of Congress approved April 21, 1904 (33 Stat. 204), I have
made a field investigation in connection with the appli-
cation of George S. Williams, a citizen by birth of the Cherokee
Nation, for the removal of the section upon the allo-
cation of his allotment (except his homestead), and am as-
sured of that investigation, satisfied that the re-
moval of sections upon the location of his allotted lands,
except as to his homestead, will be for the best interest of the
allottee, and also recommend, the approval of the
certificate does not in any manner determine the right
of the allottee to any particular tract of land.
