That I, Jeannette Cauley, Heir at Law of Lewis Cauley, a single woman of Osage County, Cherokee Nation, Indian Territory, for and in consideration of the sum of One Hundred and Twenty Five Dollars, to me paid by Commonwealth Trust Co., receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, do hereby grant, bargain, sell and convey unto the said Commonwealth Trust Co., its successors and assigns forever, the following described lot or parcel of ground, lying and being situated in the Cherokee Nation, Indian Territory of the Indian Territory to-wit: NE 1/4 of the SE 1/4 and SE 1/4 of NE 1/4 and S 1/2 of the NE 1/4 of the NE 1/4 and N 1/2 of the SW 1/4 of the NE 1/4 of Sec. 35, Twp. 21 N., Range 12 E. And NW 1/4 of the SW 1/4 of Sec. 36, Twp. 21 N., Range 12 E. And Lot # 3 of Sec. 1, Twp. 20 N., Range 12 East.

I do hereby and to hold the same unto the said Commonwealth Trust Co., its successors and assigns forever, with all appurtenances thereto belonging. And I, Jeannette Cauley, hereby covenants with the said Commonwealth Trust Co. that said lands are free from incumbrances, that she will forever warrant and defend the title to said lands against all lawful claims whatever.
