

WARRANTY DEED.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That John Tiger, a widower, heir at law of his deceased wife, Millie Tiger, party of the first part, in consideration of the sum of Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800.00) in hand paid the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, does hereby grant, bargain, sell and convey unto G. W. Barnes of Muskogee, Oklahoma, the following described real property and premises, situate in Tulsa County, State of Oklahoma, to wit:

All his undivided interest in the Southeast Quarter (SE $\frac{1}{4}$) of Section Sixteen (16), Township Seventeen (17) North, Range Thirteen (13) East of the Indian Base and Meridian, formerly in the Creek Nation of the Indian Territory, containing one hundred and sixty acres, more or less, and being the allotment of his deceased wife, Millie Tiger. Together with all the improvements thereon and the appurtenances thereunto belonging, and warrant the title to the same.

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD said described premises unto the said party of the second part, his heirs and assigns, forever, free, clear, and discharged of and from all former grants, charges, taxes, judgments, mortgages and other liens and encumbrances of whatsoever nature.

Now, to-wit: On this 12th, day of December, 1908, this cause comes on for hearing on the application of John Tiger for the approval of the sale of his life estate in the allotment of his deceased wife, Millie Tiger, and it appearing to the Court that Millie Tiger, was a full blood Creek Indian, and received ^{as} her share of the lands of the Creek Nation the following described property, to wit:

The Southeast Quarter of Section Sixteen, Township Seventeen North, of Range Thirteen East, in what is now Tulsa County, State of Oklahoma.

That the said Millie Tiger died on October 20th, 1906, leaving her husband, John Tiger and two minor children, Susanna and Melissa Tiger, and that said John Tiger is also enrolled as a full-blood Creek Indian: That the said Millie Tiger at the time of her death was a resident of that portion of the Creek Nation now embraced in Tulsa County, State of Oklahoma, and it further appearing to the Court that the said John Tiger inherited a life estate in said land from his wife Millie Tiger, and has sold said life estate to G. W. Barnes for the sum of Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800.00) and has executed a deed to said purchaser for such interest, and it further appearing to the Court that it is to the best interest of the said John Tiger that said conveyance be approved:

It is therefore considered, ordered and adjudged by this Court that the said conveyance of John Tiger of his life interest in and to the above described land to the said G. W. Barnes
