do, 23, hereby grant, bargain, sell, convey and confirm unto the said party of the second part the following described real estate and premises situated in the Cherokee Nation, and within the limits of the Indian Territory, to wit: One half of southwest quarter of section 23, Township two (2) North Range fourteen (14) East of the Indian Reserve, and being the allotment in the Cherokee Nation of Samson Sheppard deceased, of which estate I am one of the legal heirs at law now living.

together with all the improvements thereon, and the appurtenances and immunities thereunto belonging or in any wise appertaining thereto

To have and to hold the aforesigned premises to the said George R. Smith,
and his heirs and successors, in fee simple forever; and I the said Ellen May Perry
for myself and my heirs, executors and administrators do covenant with the said George R. Smith,
and his heirs, successors and assigns, that I am lawfully seized in fee of the aforesigned premises; that
they are free from all incumbrance, that I have good right to sell and convey the same to said
George R. Smith aforesaid; and that I will and my successors, heirs, executors and administrators shall warrant and de-
lend the same to the said George R. Smith.
