

LeFlore County, State of Oklahoma, and was at the time of his death a resident of that portion of the Creek Nation of the Indian Territory embraced in what is now LeFlore County, Oklahoma, that the said Sunday Crayson deceased, did leave surviving him, as his only heir at law this petitioner, Lucie Starjo, his sister, Jennie Crayson, a sister, Mattie Crayson, a brother, Buck Crayson, a brother and Dick Crayson, a brother, and that the said Sunday Crayson, deceased, had no children born to him after the 4th day of March, 1906.

The Court further finds that on the 24th day of February, 1909, the petitioner, Lucie Starjo, vice Crayson, now Lucie Kyle, made, executed and delivered a deed of conveyance to one R. A. Jonez, thereby conveying all her undivided, right, title and interest in and to the land described above, in consideration of the sum in said deed expressed, which said consideration, the Court finds is adequate, and which said deed has been exhibited to the Court.

It is therefore, by the Court considered, ordered, adjudged and decreed that the said deed above described, be by the same is hereby approved, according to section 9, of an act of Congress approved May 2, 1905, entitled, "An act for the removal of restrictions from a part of the lands of the Five Civilized Tribes, and for other purposes."
