Murphy departed this life on the 14th day of August, 1903, being an infant about two years of age, leaving as her sole and only heirs at law (see Schulthus Vs. McDougal, 56 Taw Edition 1205, U. S. Supreme Court decision) her father, Thomas Murphy and her mother, Amanda Murphy, both Cherokee Indians by blood and each inheriting an undivided one-half interest in and to said lands, according to the decision above referred to.

Affiant further says that the said Canary J. Murphy left at the time of her death two sisters and one brother, namely; Sallie Murphy, aged about fifteen years; Jessie Murphy, agod-about eleven years, and Looney Murphy, aged about five years, but that said minors were not heirs to said lands and were not entitled to share in the distribution of the proceeds of the sale of said land, but on account of an error as to the laws of inheritance then in force and effect in the Indian Territory, the interests of said minors were purchased through the United States court for the Western District of the Indian Territory and were paid the sum of \$8,100.00, which said payment was a clear loss to this affiant and his co-partner in the purchase of said land.

Affiant further says that the said Thomas Murphy and Amanda Murphy conveyed to S. R. Lewis and C. W. Eaton the entire fee of said land, as said grantors were mixed blood Indians and had a good and legal right to convey said land under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved April 26, 1906.
