ORDER APPROVING DEED OF FULL-BLOOD
INDIAN HEIR TO INHERITED LANDS.

Now, on this 22nd day of June, 1923, the petition of Chas. Page, for an order approving a certain warranty deed executed by Anna T. Adams to Ethel Davis conveying the following described real estate and premises, situate in Tulsa County, State of Oklahoma, to-wit:

The South half of the Southeast quarter and the Northwest quarter of the Southeast quarter of Section 2, Township 19 North, Range 11 East.

Came Regularly on for hearing.

The petitioner, Chas. Page, appeared by his attorney, Paul P. Pinkerton.

And the court having seen and heard read said verified petition, filed herein, and having examined said deed and having heard all the evidence adduced in support of said petition, and having listened to the arguments of counsel, and being well and fully advised in the premises, finds;

That one, Samuel Adams, was a full-blood citizen of the Muskogee or Creek Tribe of Indians, and that he was duly enrolled upon the final approved rolls of said Creek Nation, or Tribe of Indians, opposite roll No. 6957; that by virtue of his citizenship in the Creek Nation, as aforesaid, there was allotted to the said Samuel Adams, the real estate and premises, hereinbefore described; that the said Samuel Adams died intestate at or near the Indian Church House, a short distance east of Sapulpa, in Creek County, in the State of Oklahoma, on or about the 13th day of February, A. D. 1911, and left surviving him as his sole and only heirs-at-law his lawful wife, one Anna T. Adams, a full-blood citizen of the Creek Nation, enrolled upon the final approved rolls of said Nation, opposite roll No. 5424, and Jim Adams, an infant son of said Samuel Adams and said Anna T. Adams, and that said Jim Adams died intestate on the 19th day of February, 1911, in Tulsa County, State of Oklahoma, said Jim Adams, at the time of his death, being an infant son of about the age of seven (7) months.

The court further finds that upon the death of Samuel Adams the said Anna T. Adams inherited an undivided one-half interest in and to the real estate and premises, hereinbefore described, as his surviving wife, and that the said Jim Adams inherited an undivided one-
