ORDER APPROVING DEEDS.

This cause having this 18th day of January, 1924, come on to be heard upon the petition of A. A. Vierson and Geo. C. Beidleman, for the approval of certain conveyances from Alberd Tiger and wife, Robert Fife, Jennie Johnson, and husband and John Gooden, full blood Creek Indians, to them, and it appearing to the court that the

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 the W $\frac{1}{2}$ of the SW $\frac{1}{4}$ of section 32, township 19 north, range 13 east, in
 Tulsa County, Oklahoma,

was allotted and patented to the heirs of Tecumseh Tiger, deceased, who was a duly enrolled full-blood Creek Indian, that said Tecumseh Tiger died intestate, and without issue on the 6th day of February 1900, leaving and surviving him as his heirs at law, his wife, Judy Tiger, and his nephew, Alberd Tiger, both of whom were enrolled as full blood Creek Indians; that thereafter, and prior to the 15th day of November, 1907, said Judy Tiger, died intestate, and leaving surviving her as her heirs, at law, the following children, Robert Fife, Jennie Johnson, nee Gooden, John Gooden, all of whom were enrolled on the rolls of the Creek Nation as full-blood Creek Indians.

That for a good and valuable consideration, said John Gooden and Jennie Johnson nee Gooden, sold and conveyed the above described lands and premises to A. A. Vierson, and Geo. C. Beidleman; that on the 17th day of August, 1908, said Robert Fife, for a good and valuable consideration, sold and conveyed said premises to said A. A. Vierson, and Geo. C. Beidleman, and that on the 29th day of August, 1908, said Alberd Tiger, joined by his wife, sold and conveyed said premises to the said A. A. Vierson and Geo. C. Beidleman; that court further finds that the deed executed by Alberd Tiger and wife was approved by the county court of Okmulgee County, Oklahoma; the court further finds that on the ___ day of ___ 19___, said A. A. Vierson and Geo. C. Beidleman, sold and conveyed to T. C. Wickizer the above premises, and that said T. C. Wickizer sold and conveyed an undivided interest in and to said property to Margaret C. Wickizer and S. M. Farris; that soon after the 14th day of August, 1908, the grantees of said Creek citizens entered into possession of said premises and they and their grantees have ever since been in the possession of the same; that all of the original grantors in said deeds have since died and no claim has been made for said premises by any heir or representative of any of said original grantors.

The court further finds, that said allottee had his permanent place of residence, and died in that part of the Creek Nation, now embraced in Tulsa County, Oklahoma, and that this court has jurisdiction of the settlement of this estate, and that no administration is pending thereon.

The court further finds that said conveyances now presented to the court should be approved, confirmed and made effectual to convey title to said premises.

It is therefore considered, ordered and adjudged by the court, that the conveyances heretofore described, and now presented to the court for approval, are hereby approved and confirmed and made effectual to convey full title to said premises and notation of said approval is this day made on each of said instruments.
