be appointed by the court to preserve the same and collect the rentals and profits therefrom without regard to the question of value. All moneys paid on taxes, assessments and insurance as above provided shall draw interest at ten per cent per annum from the date of payment thereof by the mortgagee until paid. In case of the foreclosure of this mortgage and the sale of the property mortgaged under such foreclosure, the same may be sold with or without appraisement, at the option of the holder hereof. All homestead exemptions and stay laws are hereby expressly waived. The foregoing conditions being performed this conveyance to be void, otherwise in full force and effect.
