IN THE COUNTY COURT WITHIN AND FOR TULSA COUNTY STATE OF OKLAHOMA.

Approval of Full-blood Deed. }

Now on this 24th day of June, 1922, the above entitled cause came on for final hearing upon the approval of a deed heretofore executed by Jensey Johnson, nee Bruner, upon a petition filed in this Court on the 28th day of May 1921. The petitioner Jensey Johnson nee Bruner, appearing by her attorney, John G. Ellinghausen and Peter Deichman, United States Probate Attorney appearing on behalf of the Creek Nation.

And it appearing to the Court that Bruce Agent was a full-blood Creek Indian enrolled opposite roll # 1919 and that he died intestate, unmarried and without issue surviving him, on the 10th day of September, 1917, And that at the time of his death he was a resident and domiciled in Tulsa County, Oklahoma and living at Bixby in said County.

The Court further finds that at the time of the death of said Bruce Agent, he left surviving him, his sister, Jensey Johnson nee Bruner, a full-blood Creek Indian, enrolled opposite roll # 1920 on the final rolls of the Creek Nation. That the father and mother of said Bruce Agent had died prior to the death of Bruce Agent.

The Court further finds that on the 18th day of May, 1921, the said Jensey Johnson nee Bruner joined by her husband, William Johnson, made and executed a Warranty Deed subject to the approval of this Court, to Legus Brown for a consideration of Twenty Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) conveying to the said Legus Brown the Northwest Quarter (NW1/4) of the Northeast Quarter (NE1/4) of Section 12, Township 16 North, Range 13 East, in Tulsa County, Oklahoma, reserving however, one-half of the oil and gas rights and the production from a certain well now located on said premises.

The Court further finds that said sum of Twenty Five Hundred Dollars has been paid to said Jensey Johnson nee Bruner and that the same is a fair consideration for said land. That said land has been appraised by the Indian Department and that the amount paid exceeds said appraisal, and the testimony of disinterested witnesses has been taken as to the value of said land and from all of the evidence submitted, the Court finds that said consideration is adequate and
