DECREE OF FINAL DISTRIBUTION.

NOW on this 30th day of August, 1924, the above entitled matter coming on for hearing on the final report of the Administrator, and said Administrator's petition for Decree of final distribution; and it appearing to the Court that notice of the hearing on said final report and on the petition for distribution has been given as required by law, and the order of this Court, and the petitioner, Francis L. Thompson, appearing in person and by his attorneys, Bell & Fellows, and no one appearing to object to said report or contest the petition for final distribution, the Court, after hearing the testimony of witnesses sworn and examined, finds that the said Jack McConnell departed this life on or about the 2nd day of January, 1907, a resident of Tulsa, Indian Territory, now Tulsa County, Oklahoma, and that he died intestate and left him surviving, a widow, Josephine McConnell, and two minor children, Clayton De Vere McConnell and Dorcas Lucile McConnell, and that he left no other heirs; and that at the time of his death the said Jack McConnell was seized in fee simple title in and to the following described lands, located in what is now Tulsa County, Oklahoma, to-wit:

North Half (N/2) of Lot Three (3), in Block One Hundred Thirty Two (132), in the original town, now City, of Tulsa, Oklahoma, same being 50' by 140'

The Court further finds that the deceased left personal property consisting of monies, stocks and bonds and that the said widow, Josephine McConnell, under the law of descent and distribution, then in force in Indian Territory, wherein said lands were located, took a dower interest or estate in said lands, and that the fee simple title passed by inheritance, subject only to the said dower rights, to the children of said deceased, the said Clayton De Vere McConnell and Dorcas Lucile McConnell, the Court further finds that all the rest and residue of the property of said deceased, same consisting of money and stock in various corporations, passed by inheritance and became vested in the said Josephine McConnell, Clayton De Vere McConnell and Dorcas Lucile McConnell, share and share alike; that is to say, the said Josephine McConnell inherited a one-third (1/3) interest in said personal property, the said Clayton De Vere McConnell inherited a one-third (1/3) interest in said personal property, and the said Dorcas Lucile McConnell in-
