

to one John Carvy, a non-citizen of the Creek Nation; that as the result of said marriage there was born one child named Lewis Carvy, who is enrolled on the approved Creek Rolls opposite Roll No. 2955; that after the birth of said Lewis Carvy, on or about the ----- day of December, 1891, said John Carvy died in the Western District of the Indian Territory in what is now Tulsa County, Oklahoma; that thereafter, to-wit, on or about the ---- day of January, 1892, said Rose L. Warner, whose maiden name was Rose L. Yargee, was again married to one Gabe Warner, a non-citizen of the Creek Nation; that said Gabe Warner and said Rose L. Warner lived together as man and wife for a period of 3 years after said marriage, after which said Gabe Warner left the Indian Territory and his whereabouts were unknown until January 1923, when said Gabe Warner returned to Tulsa County, Oklahoma.

Affiant further states that said Rose L. Warner firmly believed that her said husband, Gabe Warner, was dead, it being the general rumor and current belief in the family that he was dead; that during all of the intervening years said Rose L. Warner believed him to be dead; that she never married but remained a single woman, true to his memory, and died believing that she was a widow.

Affiant further states that said Rose L. Warner had no other child except said Lewis Carvy, the child of her first husband, and that said Lewis Carvy and her said second husband Gabe Warner were her sole and only heirs. He further states that he negotiated a settlement with the said Gabe Warner, by which the said Gabe Warner deeded all his right, title and interest in all of the real and personal property, belonging to said Rose L. Warner, at the time of her death, to her said son Lewis Carvy, and in such settlement he procured from said Gabe Warner a deed conveying his said interest in and to the following, among other lands, in Tulsa County, Oklahoma, to-wit:

The West Half ($\frac{1}{2}$) of the Southeast Quarter ($\frac{1}{4}$) and the East Half ($\frac{1}{2}$) of the Northeast quarter ($\frac{1}{4}$) of the Southwest Quarter ($\frac{1}{4}$) of Section Five (5) Township Seventeen (17) North, Range Fourteen (14) East, to the said Lewis Carvy.

Affiant further states that the said Rose L. Warner departed this life, intestate, on the 23rd day of July, 1922, in Tulsa County, State of Oklahoma, and that an administration is now pending on her said estate affiant being such administrator; that the claims against her said estate have been paid and said administration is now ready to close.
