Warranty Deed

WITH RELINQUISHMENT OF DOWER.



Know All Men By These Presents:

That we Woodson Norvell and Norma L. Norvell
his wife, for and in consideration of the sum of Sixteen hundred fifty 2.00/100 DOLLARS,
cash in hand paid by Etua Belle McGee, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged.

do hereby bargain, grant, ^{convey} sell and convey unto the said Etua Belle McGee
and unto her heirs and assigns forever, the following lands lying in the Leavenworth
Western District of the Indian Territory, to-wit:

The South Twenty-five (25) feet of Lot No. One (1) and the North Twenty-five (25) feet of Lot No. Two (2) in Block No. One hundred seventy-five (175) in the town of Tulsa, according to the Official Plat and Survey thereof. This deed is given to correct the name of Norma L. Norvell as shown in the body of a prior Warranty Deed dated Aug. 18th, 1906, filed for record at Tulsa, D. I., on Aug. 22nd, 1906, at 11:55 a.m. and recorded in Book "5" at Page 201, in which deed the name of Norma L. Norvell appears at one place "Norma L. Woodson"; the two parties being one and the same, notwithstanding the discrepancy in the spelling of the name.

To have and to hold the same unto the said Etua Belle McGee and unto her heirs
and assigns forever, with all appurtenances thereunto belonging.

And hereby covenant with said Etua Belle McGee that we
will forever warrant and defend the title of said lands against all claims whatever.

And I, Norma L. Norvell wife of the said Woodson Norvell
for and in consideration of the said sum of money, do hereby release and relinquish unto the said Etua Belle McGee
all my rights of dower and homestead in and to the said lands.
