

DEED OF RELEASE

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

THAT I, A. E. Bradshaw for and the consideration of the sum of One dollar to me paid by A. F. Romig, I do hereby grant, sell, quit-claim and release unto the said A. F. Romig and unto his heirs and assigns forever, the following described real estate lying in Tulsa Oklahoma, to-wit:

The Northerly 50 feet of Lot five (5) in Block One Hundred Forty Seven (147) according to the recorded plat thereof.

This deed being made to release the lien of a certain mortgage, dated 190 and recorded 190 in Book 20 at Page 199 of the records of the United States Court at Muskogee, Indian Territory, now Oklahoma State, conveying said real estate to A. E. Bradshaw to secure the payment of certain notes therein named, the same having been fully paid.
