ORDER

And now on this 30th day of November, 1910 came on to be heard the petition of Jim Parkinson, one of the heirs at law of <sup>co-</sup>Sah-po-chung Tiger, deceased:

Said petitioner appearing by his attorney Marcus H. Taft, and after hearing the testimony and the argument of counsel; and the court being fully advised in the premises doth find:

That Sah-co-po-chung Tiger, was a full blood Creek Indian and duly enrolled as such; that by reason thereof, she had allotted to her the following described real estate to-wit: The north west quarter of section five Township 16 North range 13 east, in what is now Tulsa County, State of Oklahoma,

The court further finds that the said Sah-co-po chung Tiger died intestate on the 10th day of April 1899, leaving as her sole and only heirs at law Stanwaitie Tiger her husband, Jim Parkinson, her son, Lizzie Tiger her daughter, all of whom are of full and legal age and Jesse Tiger, her son, and Minnie Tiger, her daughter who are minors; The court further finds that the said Sah-co-po-chung Tiger had no issue born to her since the fourth day of March, nineteen hundred and six; and that at the time of her death
