ORDER

Now, on this 12th day of April, 1910, comes on to be heard the petition of J.F. Kays, for approval of a deed of conveyance from Tahsalay Carthloney, heir at law of Carthloney; said petitioner appearing in person, the said Tahsalay Carthloney appearing by Biddison & Campbell, her attorneys, and by her two sons, Willie Fox and Luke Fox, and after hearing the testimony, and the argument of counsel the court being further advised in the premises, doth find:

That Carthloney was a duly enrolled full blood Creek Indian, and by reason of such enrollment had allotted to him, the following described land, to-wit:

South half of the Southeast quarter of Section Twenty six, Township 17 North Range 13, East, in Tulsa County, Oklahoma,.

That said Carthloney died intestate on the 8th day of February 1906, in that portion of the Creek Nation, now embraced in Tulsa County, Oklahoma, leaving surviving him Tahsalay Carthloney, and his two sons, Willie Fox and Luke Fox, who are now of legal age, as his sole and only heirs at law, and left no other children or descendants of children.

That since the death of said Carthloney, said Tahsalay Carthloney made and executed to said J.F. Kays, a certain deed of conveyance, whereby she conveyed to said J.F. Kays
